# **Tech Tips - Tuning an Older Corvette**

For those of you with a 1974 and older Corvette, your car is equipped with an old school ignition system. These Corvettes have a unique distributor that has a auxiliary drive to run the mechanical tachometer. Some of those older cars have a transistor ignition system, which means the ignition contact points and condenser have been eliminated from the system. This tech tip will concern itself with contact point type ignition only.

It is relatively easy, and somewhat cost effective to renew the ignition system in an older Corvette. The process usually begins with starting and driving the car to see and feel what is needed. Prolonged cranking of the engine is the first sign your Corvette needs to be "tuned". Hesitation, stumbling under acceleration, and misfiring at higher rpm levels are sure indicators a "tune-up" is needed. The tech tip is to purchase high quality name brand components for your tune-up. There are a lot of poor quality parts out there.

{As a side note, the word "tune-up" is one of those words that has come to mean making a car run better. The truth is, the use of sound or tuning has nothing to do with making a car run better. In the 1920's through the 1930's a mechanic could buy a piece of test equipment that had a set of headphones that he connected a car's distributor. He adjusted the points until he heard a steady "buzz" in the headset. Once that "buzz" was heard, the ignition points were set properly or "tuned". The alternative back then was inserting a matchbook cover between the points and setting the opening gap based on the thickness of the paper matchbook cover. Today, many younger folks may have never seen a matchbook or know what it is used for. That "buzz" method was considered very high tech.}

The basic tune-up is to replace the spark plugs with properly gapped plugs-(usually .030 inch). Replace the distributor cap and rotor, the contact points, and the condenser. This is known as a "screwdriver tune-up" because everything on the distributor is able to be replaced with a screwdriver. Even though the parts are new, they must be set to specifications for the particular model car. GM calls out .030 point opening gap, and yes, you could still use a matchbook cover if you could find matches. However, since the 1950's a dwell meter is used to set points, and a timing light sets initial engine timing.

OK, 2 new words here- 1. dwell meter and 2. timing light. A dwell meter is attached to the distributor wire terminal on the ignition coil and the vehicle battery for operating power. The dwell meter electronically measures the amount of time the ignition points remain open. The specification for most cars is 30 degrees. 30 degrees of what? Dwell is measuring the point opening in degrees of engine rotation. There is a 1/8 inch hex head adjusting screw on the contact points. GM makes this adjustment very easy by having a little sliding door opening built into the distributor cap. While the engine is running, you would open this little door and the adjusting screw is right there for you to insert your 1/8 inch hex wrench and turn the screw until 30 degrees is indicated on the dwell meter.

{as another side note- Ford and Chrysler do not provide this running adjustment capability- you must repeatedly start and stop the engine, and remove the distributor cap while trying to hit the 30 degree spec.}

Once dwell is set, it is time to set engine timing. A strobe light is connected to the battery and a lead connects to the #1 spark plug. Each time #1 fires, the light flashes. You aim the flashing strobe at the crankshaft harmonic balancer. There are degree graduations on a small bracket near the balancer, and the balancer has a machined mark that indicates when the #1 piston is at top dead center on its' rotation. The timing spec depends on the year of the engine.

A spec for a mid-60's Corvette would be 12 degrees BTDC {before top dead center} with the vacuum advance line disconnected and plugged. At the base of the distributor, a bolt is loosened, and the distributor is turned a small amount until the timing mark indicates the specified degrees of engine rotation. Once completed, the bolt is secured, and the "tune-up" is complete. The tech tip is to always set dwell before timing. Vacuum lines are reconnected, and the carburetor idle is reset. There are additional details that can be done, such as rebuilding the carburetor, replacing the ignition wires, and decarboning the engine, but that is for another tech tip.

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
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
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# Member's Spotlight
